#### EDITORIAL DRIVEL

Well, the first issue seems to have been fairly well received. We had to increase our original print run of 100 to about double and didn't really push or promote ourselves to do that, so we know that we can get rid of enough to make the venture worthwhile. Thanks everyone and we hope we can keep you amused.

We had one minor complaint about the title, but feel the people concerned were being overtouchy. Of course we know of the religious connotation, but don't think it is offensive in any way - the same as pop groups like The Christians and Jesus and Mary Chain aren't.

We have had one or two contributions but would like a lot more. We know that people from Humberside, Guildford, Merseyside and other places have ordered copies - it would be nice to hear from you.

Jamie McGowan's move to Dundee has provoked a deal of consternation locally. He was not on a contract so we got no money for someone who was obviously a promising and talented player.

Contracts are a funny thing for non-league and even lower division Football League sides. Indeed not many sides can afford to put all their players on contracts. It is not just as easy as getting someone to sign a piece of paper.

If a player is on the dole, for example, the club will have to pay him enough to make it worth his while coming off the dole - which he must do if he is earning from football.

Also, once a player is on contract he is paid whether he plays or not, whether he is injured or not. Often clubs regret putting players on contracts as they lose form or get injured and the club has to shell out a lump sum to pay them off.

On balance, and certainly in hindsight, we believe McGowan was worth investing in. Events will, we think, prove it would have been a wise investment. But it is a dodgy decision for a club without bars of cash to have to make.

Last season if a defender (let's call him "Ollie") outsprinted a forward (let's call him "wobbly buffalo") to steer a ball back to his keeper, he would have got a cheer and a chorus of "You'll never beat the Ollie".

This season it will be a free kick almost certainly in a dangerous position.

Just what the hell are FIFA or UEFA or whoever playing at?

If a keeper plays the ball out to a defender, that defender will no longer take the risk of playing a ball back if an opponent puts him under pressure. So surely keepers are going to play safe and hoof the ball upfield. Is this why clubs have been clamouring to sign Dion Dublin?

All it needed was for referees to be allowed to book outfield players if they thought they were repeatedly passing the ball back to waste time. But then we're dead clever and everyone else is thick!.......So There!

Signed by Lawrie Milligan (another potential player you loved to hate) at the beginning of the 89/90 season. He arrived in a blaze of publicity (well, the Visitor mentioned we had signed someone or other) along with a posse of players from near neighbours and deadly enemies Fleetwood Town.

Jimmy made a great start to his Shrimps career, starring in the middle of the park in a pre-season friendly against newly promoted Port Vale of the 2nd Division. The highlight of the match being the only goal, scored by Vale's new star signing Neil Aspin (from Leeds Utd, £200,000) who unfortunately put through his own goal after just fifteen seconds of his debut.

It was around early September that other fans began to look at me as though I was from the Royal Albert, when I kept insisting "That Collins will do alright, he had a belter against Port Vale, honest".

Although Jimmy looked like a non-league footballer (small and a moustache) he did have one outstanding feature.......his voice. # HOW TO BE A GITT



OUR RESIDENT moaner, Mr Maurice Gitt, is getting on a bit and may not be able to fulfill his current role for too many more years.

We will need to appoint a replacement and, when the time comes, the successful whinger will need to demonstrate his or her competence for the job.

Evidence of experience in several spectating aspects will be required, so here are a few tips to be working on to stand you in good stead.

- 1 NEVER congratulate player for anything he does well, no matter what the temptation. Always try and find something negative. If a player beats three men and whacks a goal in from 30 yards, try: "About bloody time, he's done bugger all else!" - 3 ALWAYS stand in exactly the same spot for each game, whatever the weather. Preferably close enough to the manager to have a go at him when we are only beating Accrington 4-1 etc. A recognised voice coming regularly from the same direction maintains continuity.
- 4 NEVER refer to players by Christian or nicknames. It's always "Coleman, yer crap". "Lodge, yer a donkey" etc. A forename signifies familiarity and support for a player bad image!
- 5 ALWAYS complain about the price on the turnstile. Don't accept any guff about it being the minimum the club is allowed by the league to charge, that doesn't negate your right to moan. As turnstile operators frequently change you have the opportunity to be a pain to several people in a season.
- 6 MAKE sure you attend every single home game. Every game you attend is another opportunity to let everyone know that Morecambe are so crap you will never attend another game again!

- ALWAYS compare current players with players from many years ago or anonymous young reserves. It's no good saying: "Cain's garbage, get McNally on!" because if that materialises you are then stuck with having to support McNally (which obviously you would never do) to retain credibility. If you shout: "Timmins would have bagged that" or "The Reserves could do better" they will never get the chance so you can't be proved wrong. (Be careful here not to use Keith Galley as an example he may not be finished yet!)
- 8 DON'T be put off by people reminding you how well we are doing now compared to various periods in the past. However well the team are doing, they should be doing better! None of today's players is as good as any from the '60s and it is your duty to remind people that the club is under an obligation to get rid of the manager after each game. The fact you were saying the same things in 1963 will be remembered by few and pointed out only by fellow gripers!

Remember, we must protect our civil liberties and safeguard the traditions of our national sport - fight for the right to be a complete twat!

The very name conjures up a vivid image, a sun kissed beach, the Pacific lapping gently on the seashore, palm trees swaying in the warm breeze, a topless Polynesian girl serving 'Margaritas'

In truth, its grim, its urban, its got a 1960's concrete shopping centre, and the sixteen stone female Clubhouse Steward throws flat pints of Bass at you and growls for the money.

This ground is very unusual (but not unique) in that you may only spectate from 3 sides. Behind one goal are the back gardens of a row of '30s semis. Most of them have new windows, probably due to wayward shooting and large gaps in the plastic fencing behind the net.

On the remaining 3 sides there is covered terracing, on one side with benches bolted to the floor all the way along. Behind the goal, two steps of terracing and a little tin roof (see pic), and finally, the smallest Main Stand I've ever seen in the Premier Heague, even

Its a tight little ground, small crowds packed in along the touchlines, and the inevitable Droylsden drizzle, make it an intimidating place to visit. If you are Pretenders to the Throne, and fail here, you haven't got what it takes.

# 6th OCTOBER SOUTHPORT

Haig Avenue has a depressing "what used to be" look about it these days. When the 'Port first joined the Premier League in the '70s it looked impressive to my young eyes, but now, devoid of any covered standing area, open on three sides to the seaside elements, the whole place is enveloped in a shabby air of despair.

The magnificent two thousand seater Main Stand is a heady reminder of Football League days, and on most non-league grounds would be the focal point. But the lack of facilities everywhere else only seems to accentuate the structure as something of a seaside white elephant.

On the plus side, pies are good and the programme is always jaunty and has some good statistics, and the Chinese chippy 50 yards from the ground is <u>almost</u> as good as Thorpe's or Harry's.

# 17th OCTOBER HYDE UNITED

The sign outside says. "Welcome to Ewan Fields", and that is all you get, a welcome.


The ground is owned by Tameside Council, who installed the artificial surface, upgraded the floodlights, and built a completely new cantilever grandstand (which has a Directors box behind double-glazed windows).

The natives are friendly enough, pies are good, beer is passable, and the ground?

Covered on three sides, behind one goal, by a tin roof of similar type that used to grace Christie Park, the afformentioned cantilever stand, and a bike shed affair down half of one side.

The remainder is uncovered, a gravel/grass hill behind the other goal and little else.

It is all functional without being friendly, but is worth a visit because they don't throw you off the pitch at half-time if you nip on for a kickabout. It is also interesting to see a different style of game on "plastic".

# 20th OCTOBER MARINE

ROSSETT PARK, CROSBY, this must be one of the worst in the league, IT'S CRAP!! Basically three sided due to gardens down one side, the rest leaves a lot to be desired. Opposite to the gardens is a tiny covered terrace about ten feet deep. The main entrance brings you past Crosby's very own Tenko to the terrace which is covered at the back of one half, opposite to this is their bike shed of a Main Stand with a small terrace in front.

Watch out for mouthy locals who enjoy throwing things at your cars and generally getting on your nerves.

Assorted pubs on Main Street, including the Mariner just outside, plus a reasonable chippy on the left outside the ground.

# 31st OCTOBER MOSSLEY

Good day out this one, reasonable pub outside, worth starting there and then in to ample sized Clubhouse. Compact ground with stand on left of entrance, covered terrace to right behind goal, covered terrace down side leading to school end. This is a slag heap style end with a ski-jump gradient to it, great for "surging" your mates

down. From the summit of this you have a nice aerial view of the match. According to "where's the bar" its worth watching out for missiles launched from the school around November 5th, you have been warned.

3 POINTS A MUST

### 7th NOVEMBER BISHOP AUCKLAND

One of the best days out last season, plenty of good pubs in town and an excellent Clubhouse even if you have to pay. The ground itself is a little strange due to its other life as a cricket ground. On one side there is a small pavillion style stand for board members and a small terrace continuing round behind the goal. Opposite to this is the cricket pitch.

But we have left the best to last, the side opposite the Pavillion has two steep terraces which flank the wooden girder stand. Watch from the cricket field when attacking that end, but for second half go into the main stand for an excellent view and give it some atmosphere. This is a great stand even though it has seen better days.

Locals are a bit mouthy but no real problem.

# 21st NOVEMBER BUXTON

The genteel air of this majestic victorian spa-town is quickly left behind when you enter "Silverlands".

Situated on a hill above railway sidings, it is pretty much your average Premier League set up, functional and bland.

The Main Stand still posesses its glass end panels (a rarity) and is good protection from the elements.

An open end with a slight hill of gravel/grass and a good view of the countryside is complemented by the covered terrace running almost the full length of one touchline. Behind the other goal is a cosy covered terrace where most of Buxtons old codgers assemble to have a moan.

Pies are O.K, programme is a bit on the thin side, but that doesn't usually matter as we collect three points.

By the way, have I mentioned that it is the highest ground in England to entertain Pro or Semi-pro soccer, well I have now.






